Our History

Caring Since 1989

AIDS Housing Association of Tacoma was founded in 1989 with help from the community and Christ Episcopal Church of Tacoma. The goal was to provide safe, alternative housing for people with HIV/AIDS in Pierce and Kitsap Counties.

In 1990, **Three Cedars** opened its doors providing 24-hour care to six residents. In 2005, **Project Open Door** launched two more homes to provide housing for chronically homeless individuals.

Today, with help from AHAT many residents experience such profound improvement that they return to independent living.

AIDS Housing Association of Tacoma, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, receives City, State, and Federal grant funding. The community and volunteers still provide much-needed financial support.

Three Cedars

Stabilizing Health

Three Cedars, a 24/7 care facility, remains the only facility of its kind from King County to the Oregon border to offer housing and enriched services to people with HIV/AIDS.

Three Cedars residents receive medical assistance, medication management, active daily living assistance, medical services, informal counseling.

Our communal family-style home environment, reduces residents' stress, contributing directly to improvements in emotional and physical well-being.



Project Open Door

Promoting Self Sufficiency



A collaborative venture between AIDS Housing Association of Tacoma and the Pierce County AIDS Foundation, Project Open Door commenced services in 2005 to move chronically homeless individuals into two safe, affordable homes.

Through Project Open Door, residents receive intensive case management, chemical dependency group support, life-skills training, mental health services, and nutrition education.
